SAD DEATH OF HEN SHOWS PERILS OF INFLATION: Consider the story about inflation told by O. B. Miller, staunch Republican publisher of the Orient (Iowa) Avalanche.

The Orient scribe has a flock of chickens. Friday, two weeks ago, one of his hens laid a double-yolk egg.

The Saturday egg was normal in size and content, having the standard one yolk. But on Sunday, Monday and Tuesday she repeated the Friday performance and again produced eggs having double yolks.

SUNDAY SCHOOL "PUT ON SPOT": Blamed for retarding religious progress, Sunday Schools were "put on the spot" at the Religious Education Association conference in Cincinnati and threatened with abandonment.

A proposal to withdraw Sunday Schools from the religious curriculum of churches was made before the association by Dr. Adelaide Case of Columbia University, who asserted that the schools were ineffectual and out of date.

Sunday Schools also were attacked before the association by Rabbi Isaac Lardman of New York, editor of the American Hebrew, who characterized them as a "costly liability," and branded them as breeders of atheism and agnosticism.

Action on the proposal to abolish Sunday Schools was postponed, however, by the conference.

MERCHANDISING COMPETITION: Local merchandising is no longer in control of the local merchant. Time was when the local group could get together and by regulating hours, costs, practices and prices, would exercise a definite control on the business of the community.

UNIVERSITY INSTRUCTOR IS WINNER OF MUSIC PRIZE

In competition with many other young American composers, Hunter Johnson, instructor in the University of Michigan School of Music has been announced as winner of the Prix de Rome, providing two years of study and travel in Europe with residence at the American Academy in Rome, and an annual stipend of \$1400.

Officially known as the Juillard Fellowship in Musical Composition at the American Academy in Rome, the award is given by a distinguished jury of composers and conductors to the contestant whose works show creative talent which may be expected to develop in an important degree. It has been previously given to Howard Hanson and Leo Soverby, two American composers whose work will be heard at the coming May Festival in Ann Arbor.

It was a rare treat to listen to the Grand Rapids Symphony Orchestra in its rendition of Cesar Franck's "Symphony in D Minor." Rosalind F. Eyer, reviewer, considers it one of the greatest symphonic works that has appeared thus far in the literature of the world's music.

Subtlety of nuance, and refinement, and hypnotic sequence and perfect instrumental clarity and a host of other supremely rare ingredients go into his exalted creation. The "Symphony in D Minor" is a tri-faceted jewel, all beauty
