BANDITS CAPTURED AS OPERATOR GIVES ALARM

A little colored boy, strolling casually down one of the main thoroughfares in the town of Arkadelphia, Ark., got the scare of his young life the other day. But as it turned out, it was well worth while. He happened to glance through the big windows of the Citizens Bank and there he saw several men and women holding their hands high up over their heads, while two masked men were pointing pistols at them.
 The boy rushed to the drugstore next door to the bank and told the clerk what he had seen. The clerk then called the telephone exchange, and the operator, Miss Ora Gorham, in turn called the marshal, sheriff, and other people who she felt might be of assistance. While she was doing this, she rang the extension telephone in the bank's vault continuously, thinking that if any one answered it, she would explain that help was being sent.
 The continued ringing of the telephone bell alarmed the robbers, who rushed out of the bank and found themselves surrounded by the citizens of the town. The little negro boy and the operator, whose alertness in ringing the vault extension prevented the robbery, received much praise. The president of the bank also gave himself a pat on the back because the extension telephone in the vault had proved so valuable an investment.

 Mrs. Wright read a poem about a temperance horse, dog, and cat.
 Miss Playter's last number was a poem, "Built with Blood," inspired by the author's seeing a beautiful mansion built by a saloon keeper, as she was touring in Canada. As it was under construction, someone at night scratched the words, "Built with Blood," on the corner stone.

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS, That whereas House Enrolled Act Number 30 of the 57th Legislature of Michigan in Extra Session of 1934 provides that within ten days after the approval of said act by the governor, the governor shall issue his writ of election for the purpose of submitting the approval or disapproval of said act, and the several projects therein provided to the qualified electors of this state.
