Ed Link of Hudson Believes in Diamonds

For accuracy on this operation there is nothing like a diamond drill, says Ed Link, veteran machinist in the plant of the Hudson Motor Car Company. This is one of the many operations that has to be held to extremely close limits. Ed Link states that he has very little leeway on this operation. In the parlance of the machine shop the hole has to be held within plus zero and minus three-thirtieths. This means that it cannot be oversized at all nor undersize more than three-thirtieths of one-thousandth of an inch. This is splitting hairs as far as accuracy is concerned and that is why the diamond drill is used on Hudson and Terraplane piston pin holes drilled in the aluminum alloy pistons.
