BROWN STAMPS IN WAR RATION BOOK No. 3 NOW VALID!

The Office of Price Administration has announced that, beginning September 12, Brown Stamps in War Ration Book 3 will be used to purchase rationed meats, fats, oils, and rationed dairy products... all foods now rationed under the red stamp program.

- ★ Red Stamps, X, Y, Z in War Ration Book 2 will also remain valid for the purchase of these foods... through October 2.
- ★ Broken Ration Stamps A in Book 3 (totaling 16 points) become good on September 12 and are valid through Oct. 2.
- ★ Broken Ration Stamps B in Book 3 (totaling 16 points) become good on September 19 and are valid through Oct. 2.
- ★ Weekly thereafter a new Brown Stamp in Book 3 will become good for the purchase of rationed meats, fats, oils, dairy products, etc., remaining valid throughout the month.
