Over The Waves At 100 Miles An Hour



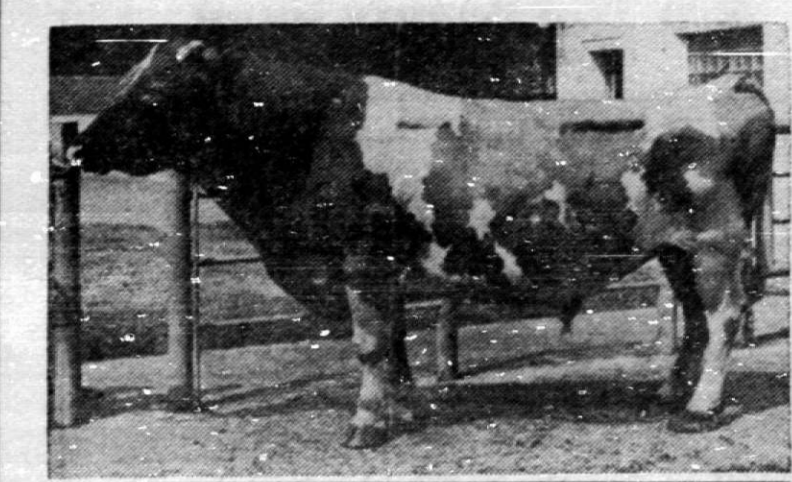

RED BANK, N. J. — The question of whether it is possible to drive a speedboat at an average of 100 miles per hour during a race may be answered when the National Sweepstakes Regatta is held here on August 5th and 6th. At least half a dozen of the nation's highest powered boats and most skilled drivers will attempt what has hitherto been impossible — to hit an average speed of 100 miles an hour over a two and one-half mile course on the Navesink River.

Such a feat would not only establish a competitive world's record, but would automatically admit the driver to the tightest little circle in marine racing — the "100 Mile An Hour Club", sponsored by the Gulf Oil Corporation.
Only nine men have ever piloted a speedboat that fast over a marked course, and in each case it was during a trial run, not in a race. Eight of these men were charter members of the club. Their names read like a list of marine racing's immortals — Guy Lombardo, Gar Wood, Stanley Dollar, "Wild Bill" Cantrell, Harold Wil-

son, Jr., Lou Fageol, Dan Arena, and Horace Dodge. The ninth and latest member, Stanley Sayre, recently set a new world's record of 160.32 miles per hour, and will be officially welcomed into the Club during Gulf's Annual Marine Racing Hall of Fame Dinner early next year.

And yet, nobody has averaged 100 miles per hour during a race. That's why sports fans are focusing their attention on the National Sweepstakes Regatta at Red Bank. The best drivers and the fastest boats will be on hand — and it could happen here.



CESOR PONTIFF'S ANCHOR, 281510

A dairy herd with a substantial anchor to tie down its production values will be a better and more profitable herd. In this case, Anchor is the name of a Guernsey Bull in use by the Michigan Artificial Breeders Cooperative, Inc., at East Lansing.

This bull, born in 1939 and bred at C. E. Sorenson Farms in Farmington, was used by Howard Coiby at Romeo. In this location 17 daughters with 24 records averaged 10,114 milk and 475 fat. This yield was 1,354 pounds milk and 55.8 pounds fat improvement in the daughters over the dams.

Even though ten years old, Anchor has been used by the Michigan Artificial Breeders Cooperative, Inc., for the past year and has been recognized as one of the outstanding Guernsey sires in the organization.

The dam, named Cinderella, has outstanding records and is also the dam of another bull used by the MABCI. This second bull is known as Clair.

The West Soil Conservation District board of directors held their July meeting with a group of farmers from the southern part of the district. One thing that was very apparent at this meeting was the power of water when out of control. The date was July 17 and water was standing in the fields and pouring across the road in many places. Of course, out-of-control planting and sod waterways cannot completely eliminate erosion during such a rainstorm as that. However, there were gullies washed during that storm that a good sod waterway might have prevented or partly controlled.

The question was brought up as to why the district is still officially called the Northwest District instead of West Kent District. The state office said it would mean a lot of voting and re-voting to change it so officially it must remain the Northwest Soil Conservation District, but there is no reason why the two districts shouldn't be commonly referred to as the East Kent and West Kent districts.

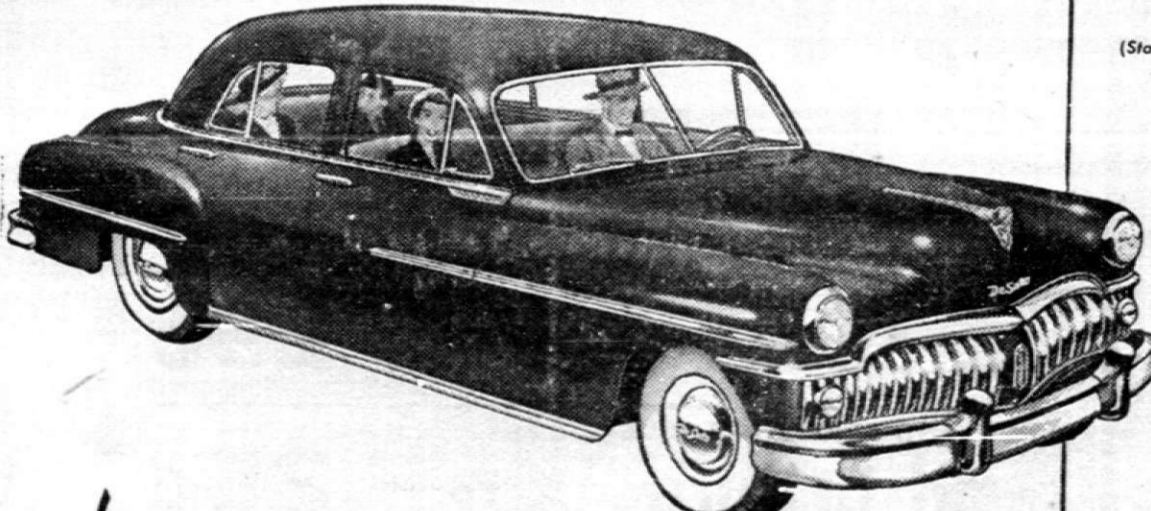

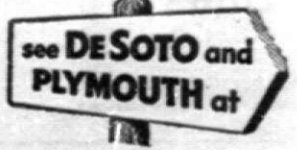
