IGNORANCE OF THE LAW IS NO EXCUSE...

**DID YOU KNOW?**

In real property transactions, as well as some others, the meaning of the legal term, "Buyer Beware!" is interpreted just as the words imply—if a purchaser has inspected property he is buying and the seller has made no misrepresentation, nor tried to mislead him, the purchaser buys on his own responsibility. One might say that, in such a case, "he sticks out his own neck," concerning the property purchased.

**DID YOU KNOW?**

In a criminal action, where evidence is secured illegally, the defendant may object to the introduction of it, and any evidence secured subsequent and as a result unlawful seizure.

**DID YOU KNOW?**

That the plaintiff suing for damages where a death resulted from the negligence of the defendant, cannot collect for "the death" as such, but only for the damages resulting therefrom? If death was instantaneous and the deceased experienced no pain or suffering, there also may be no damages for this cause.

**DID YOU KNOW?**

That an auto driver involved in an accident may be presumed negligent, in many jurisdictions, if he is violating the law at the time of the accident.

**DO YOU KNOW?**

How would a net operating loss for 1952 be used as a net operating loss deduction by an individual taxpayer?

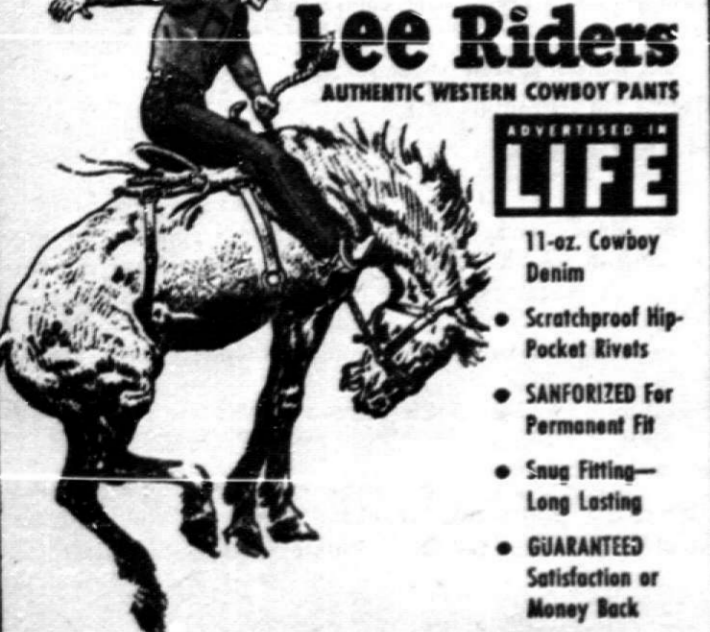
