shoppers . . . those who still don't have 1965 plates . . . will be able to shop until 8:00 p.m. this Saturday (February 27) or until everyone in line has been served.

Secretary of State James M. Hare has informed the more than 200 branch offices of the Secretary of State that Saturday, the 27th, is the deadline to buy plates, and to stay open late for the convenience of last-minute plate shoppers.

The 1965 licensing year becomes official on Monday, March I, and all cars must show new plates.

Hare reminded motorists that they can bring either their titles or prior year's registration when they buy their plates.

The Secretary of State said he expected sales to go well over the 4 1/4 Million mark by the close of 1965, setting an all-time record. More than 3 million plates will be sold by the end of the rush on Feb-
