## School Voters Okay Millage For Annual Sparta

Monday approved millage proposals in both districts. Voters in Sparta also elected one new school board member while re-electing another.

Sparta favored a seven mill proposal by a vote of 419 to 290 with 13 ballots void.

Of a field of six school board candidates, Lee F. Moore, seeking his second term on the board, garnered a total of 350 votes. Mrs. L. E. (Athena) Eary came in second with 321 votes to win a spot on the board. She is replacing A. Barth Carlson, jr., who did not seek re-

Other candidates ran as follows: Kenneth Lockard, 310; Henry Beverwyk, 309; Barbara Martens, 53, and Lynn Gilleo, 43.

A total of 722 residents of the Sparta district went to the polls. Kent City voters okayed a two mill proposal 129 to 69 and the transfer of funds from one account cattle show and tractor pulling conto another 162-37. Clifford Longcore, running unopposed, received 172 votes in running for re-election to the school board.

Two hundred votes were cast in the Kent City district.


