INTRODUCTION

This Finding Aid was compiled using the Sparta Sentinel-Leader archive available online at SpartaHistory.org.

The earliest "I Remember..." column that was found in the archive appeared in the October 21, 1964, issue. The last column found was dated August 23, 1971.

From October 21, 1964, to August 23, 1871, there were 358 issues of the Sparta Sentinel-Leader published.

During that period, 201 "I Remember..." columns have been located. That includes 6 issues in which two different columns appeared.

There are 9 issues from the above dates that are entirely missing from the online archive: December 23, 1964, April 3, 1968, May 29, 1968, June 5, 1968, June 12, 1968, July 10, 1968, January 8, 1969, May 7, 1969, and September 3, 1969.

There are 154 issues during the time frame in which no "I Remember...." column was found.

NOTE

With a few exceptions, the online archive of the Sparta Sentinel-Leader is separated into multiple two-page pdf files.

The provided links will take the user to the <u>first</u> page of the two-page pdf file in which the selected "I Remember..." column appears. If the "I Remember..." column is on the second page, the user will have to use page down to locate it.

The Volume and Page Numbers included below reference the two black binders of printed columns that were prepared for the Sparta Township Historical Commission. They are not the volume and page number of the original newspaper issue.

ADDITIONAL COLUMNS

There are at least five (possibly more) "I Remember..." columns that are included in the Sparta Township Historical Commission's white binder of "I Remember..." columns that were not located in the online archive of Sparta Sentinel-Leader issues.

A comparison is currently being conducted to specifically identify those issues and an addendum will be added to this finding aid with that information when the review is complete.
