



Spartan Musicians Honored

The Sparta High cafeteria was the scene for the annual Music Department Award Banquet on Thursday, June 2. Following a potluck dinner, the award presentations began with recognition of all band and choral soloists and ensemble members, including the first-division finishers. School Election-June 13

The annual school election for the Sparta Area Schools will be held on June 13 from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. at the Sparta Civic Center, 75 N. Union Street. Absentee ballots may be obtained from the board offices in the High School or from Floyd Buege at 160 E. Division, Sparta.

Candidates for the Board of Education are Neil Andrus, Athena Eary (incumbent), and Fredrick

Thorne. There are two openings for terms running from July 1, 1977 to June 30, 1981. Also on the ballot is a request for eight mills for two years. This is renewal millage and will not increase the operational millage that was levied in 1976.

All registered voters residing in the Sparta Area School District are eligible to vote.

Community Band and Summer Lessons

Beginning June 20, 1977, a Summer music program, consisting of both private lessons and a Summer Community Band, will be offered at Sparta High School.

Rehearsals for the Community Band will be held on Monday evenings, from 7-9, in the High School Bandroom. Persons interested in playing must be at least the age of an entering high school freshman. Rehearsals will run from June 20, through the month of July and into August, after which one outdoor concert will be held (exact concert date and location not yet determined.) Music selected will be basically that of the concert type, and will be determined to a great extent by the members of the performing organization.

Private lessons will be offered, as last year, to any students entering at least into the sixth grade. Students registering for the lessons will receive a half-hour lesson, once a week, for six weeks. Make-up lessons will be given for vacations, band trips, illness, or other important conflicts. All lessons will be held in the High School Bandroom during weekdays, from 9 a.m.-4 p.m. Specific time requests will be granted on a first-come-first-served basis.

Director of the Community Band, and instructor for the private lessons will be Bill Fisher, an instrumental music major from Central Michigan University, and the instructor of last year's private lesson program. Since becoming a music major at C.M.U., Bill has worked with various musical organizations, from the beginning stages of playing through the college level. In addition to directing, he has also run the private lesson programs at several surrounding school districts.
