AG. DEPT. SCHOOL NOTES

The financial summary of projects carried during 1929-30 reveals a substantial gain over former years. From the fifteen projects reported on an income of \$2,636.37 was totaled; we never before have had an income from the twelve to fifteen projects written up, of over \$1,000.

The income from a project includes not only the net income but what the boy allows himself for his labor is added to make what is called the "net project income."

The above increase can be attributed to different types of projects as to quality than those carried heretofore. Not very large incomes have been shown from the common crop projects such as beans and potatoes. This last year three of the boys Victor Hubert, Carroll Bultema, and Willis Anderson finished reports on dairy cows. The first two boys figured for just one cow. Willis Anderson however, reported on his six pure bred Guernsey cows. This project alone totaled over \$800.

Another project on livestock that bears interest is a poultry enterprise carried by Clare Sweet; from the 225 hens fed his net project income was over \$150. Clare did not get less than 40 cents per dozen for any of his eggs. Hatcheries are willing to pay a premium on eggs from hens of known quality breeding.

Howard Bettes feels well satisfied with his certified seed venture. He bought registered Spartan barley seed, the seed from which he was allowed to sell as certified after inspection. He sold his 170 bushels readily and had sale for many more if he had had them. Howard has doubled his acreage to sixteen this year; this will be fed to a bunch of steers. Jesse fattens a bunch every year.

Other boys who wrote on projects this spring are Stanley Morton, Norman Olsen, Milton Wylie, Harmon Boech, Burnett Hersey, Harold Her and Robert Winn.

The following boys are working on projects this summer: Melvin Andrus, Harold Cook, Wayne Hessel, Harold Idema, Fred Longcore, Arnold Olsen, Harry Bottruff, Stanley Morton, Thorpe Robinson, Milton Wylie, Norman Olsen, Wilbur Reister, Willis Anderson, Howard Bettes and Robert Winn.

Milton Wylie and Willis Anderson have certified Spartan barley growing. Their seed and Howard Bettes' will be high quality seed but they will not be allowed to call their crop as "certified" seed. One must buy "registered" seed to sell as "certified." The best fields in the state are picked each year to be sold as "registered."

Harvey Bottruff has an acre of very good certified Russet Rural potatoes planted, but because he lacks the proper spraying equipment will not be allowed to sell his crop as "certified." With potatoes one can sell "certified" seed but other important specifications must be met.

This is an opportunity for someone to buy seed of "certified" quality at "near certified" prices. All the boys working this year are well started which is encouraging. The actual working of a project and putting some very good knowledge acquired into practice never bothers the boys so much as the bookkeeping part of it. After they have sold their product a story and financial statement must be made out on a form in duplicate furnished by the state. One copy is sent into Lansing and the other is kept at the school here.
