The meeting was called to order by President L. A. Wilder.

The minutes of the last annual meeting were read by Secretary J. D. Kreps.

The annual financial report was read by Secretary J. D. Kreps. It was moved by Art Trofast and supported by Larry Saur that the report be accepted as read.
