GOVERNOR ROMNEY REPORTS:

A Michigan Week Message

The national and world spotlights are on Michigan this week. During this 10th annual Michigan Week celebration, our great state is wearing its best suit and putting its best foot forward.
For seven days (May 19-25), more than 10,000 citizens are joining together to unfold the story of Michigan, both in serious undertakings and in a light manner.

Michigan has much to be proud of - much to boast about to the world.
While this 10th anniversary celebration, with its appropriate theme of "Science and Research For Our Future", is an excellent vehicle for promoting the state's greatness, I think it is also important to sell Michigan, its vacations, its products and its industrial potential all year long - at home and abroad.
Each of us should feel a strong sense of duty, coupled with intense pride, to promote our state - at all times, to all people, in all places. We who live in Michigan are its best salesmen and we have an impressive historical, cultural and economic story to tell.
We can modestly point out that: --It was two years before the Pilgrims landed at Plymouth Rock in 1618 that Etienne Brule reached what is now Michigan's Upper Peninsula, and the state's first permanent settlements were made at Sault Ste. Marie in 1668 and at St. Ignace in

1671 by Fathers Dablon and Marquette.

--Four flags - French, English, Spanish and American - have flown over our state, and now it is an unmatched combination of industrial empire, recreation paradise and diversified agriculture.

--Michigan's shoreline is longer than either the Atlantic or Pacific coastlines.

--Ironwood is as far west as St. Louis, Mo.; Hancock is farther north than Montreal, Canada; and Port Huron is as far east as Greenville, S. C., or Asheville, N. C.

--Michigan leads all states in per capita support of higher education.

--Michigan has 109,643 miles of public roads and streets - enough to go around the equator four times.

--Labor's achievements in Michigan have added a brilliant page to the state's history. The Detroit Mechanics' Society, founded in 1818, was one of the first unions in the nation.

--The 320-mile new highway stretching from the Ohio border to the Straits of Mackinac is the nation's longest toll-free superhighway.

--Michigan's farmers gross more than \$770 million annually from 15 million crop acres and the annual retail value of agricultural output in the state is over \$2 billion.

--Direct tourist expenditures in 1962 were estimated at \$680 million.

--Michigan ranks second among the 14 leading industrial states in productivity as measured by value added per employe, and ranks third by value added per man hour.

--The Upper Peninsula Copper Country, the largest commercial deposit of native copper in the world, has yielded nearly 11 billion pounds during the past century.
For the past few years Michigan's name and reputation has suffered. It was called a problem state, a poor state in which to do business. We still have many hurdles to overcome. But, Michigan has made an about face and once again is headed in a forward direction.

Excessive political bickering, which handicapped our state in the past, has subsided and I hope will not be renewed. This year our Legislature set one of the most progressive and distinguished records in recent history. Both of these changes have favorably impressed businessmen everywhere.

Job-producing employers, instead of leaving our state, are staying to build and grow. Today, economic experts are predicting impressive capital spending in Michigan industry.

Auto manufacturing companies have committed themselves to investments of over \$1.1 billion in facilities and equipment during 1963. Our five major public utility companies have made plans to invest more than \$240,000 in the state this year.

Job opportunities in manufacturing concerns are expected to increase 17 percent within the current decade and service jobs will increase 30 percent, according to economic predictions.

It is this rebirth of industry, renewed faith and vigor, a self-confidence and spirit of team play that will usher Michigan into one of the brightest decades of its history.

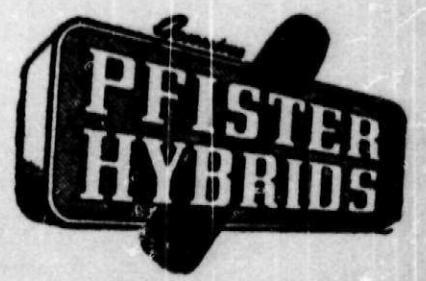

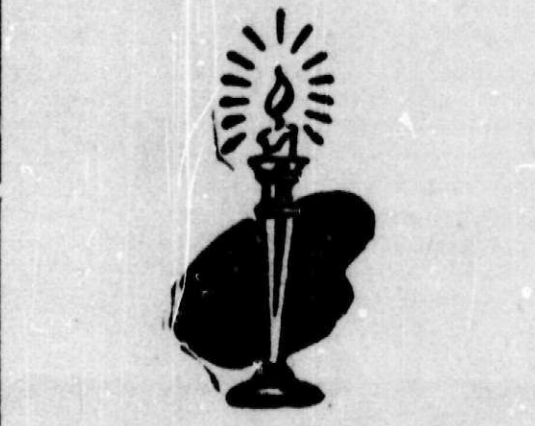

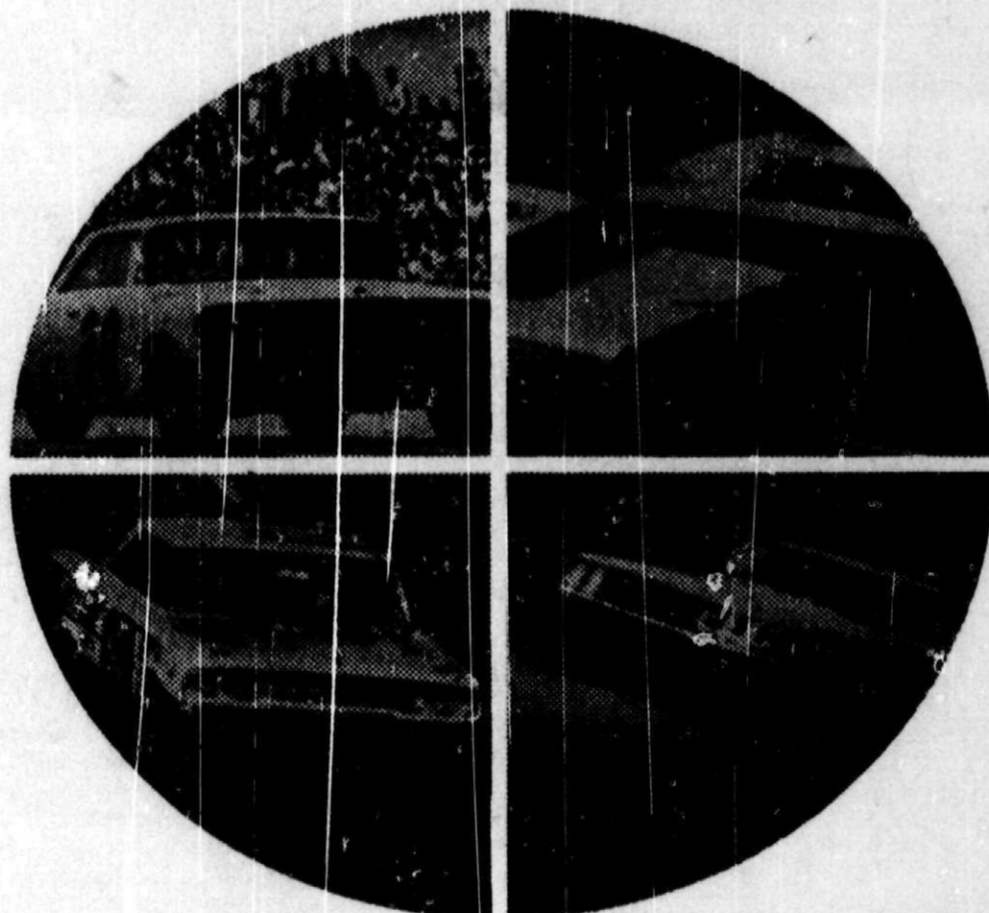
ALL-GAMES PARTY
